THE URBAN EDGE – POINTS OF DIFFERENTIATION

Our portfolio is concentrated in the DC to Boston corridor, the most densely populated region in the U.S., with an average 3-mile population density of 200,000 people - the highest in the sector. Grocers anchor 80% of our assets, generating sales of +\$950/ft

2

Achieved FFO as Adjusted 3-year CAGR of 6% through 2025. We are targeting a long-term, annual growth rate of 4-5% per share. Our growth drivers include:

- ▢ A strong pipeline of signed but not opened leases accounting for 7% of net operating income
- ▢ More than 80% of SP NOI growth expected from executed leases, LOIs and contractual rent increases through 2027
- ▢ Redevelopment initiatives totaling \$155M, expected to deliver a 12% return
- ▢ Strategic capital recycling – Since October 2023, we have acquired \$696M of high-quality shopping centers at a 7% cap rate and sold \$554M of non-core, low growth assets at a 5.4% cap rate
- ▢ Rent growth from below-market leases and contractual rent increases - new rent spreads exceeded 20% for four consecutive years

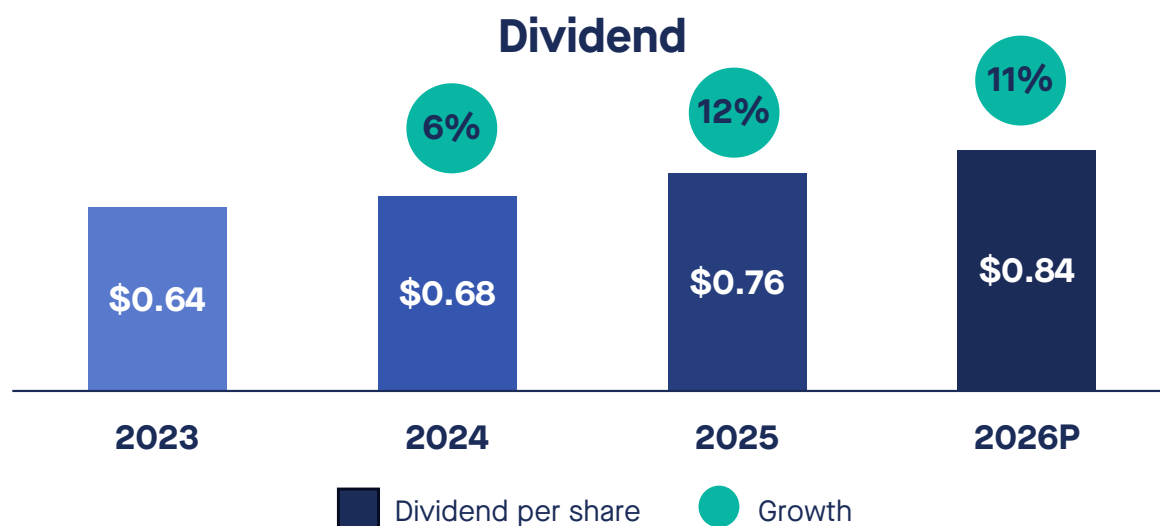
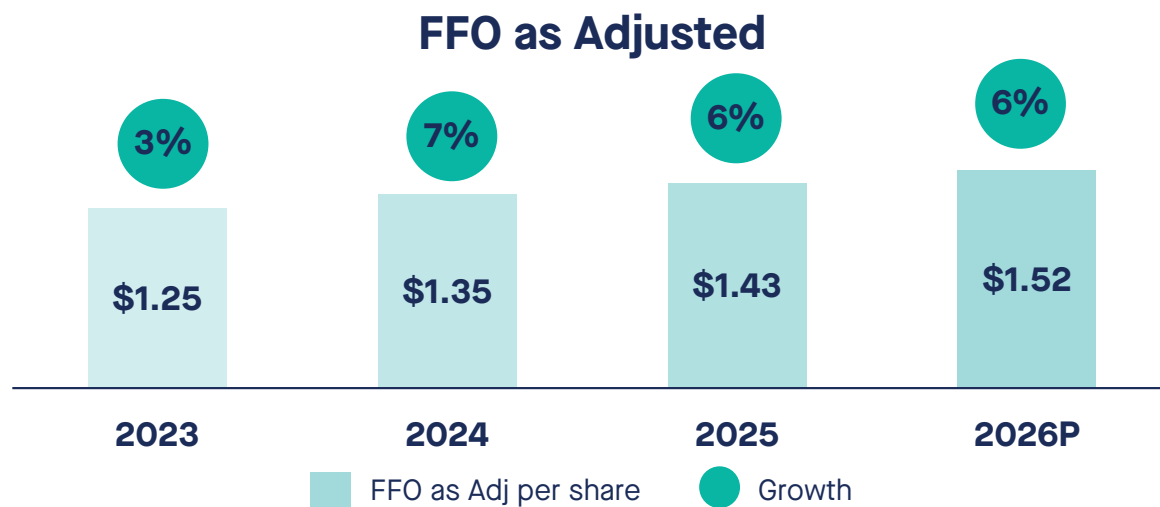

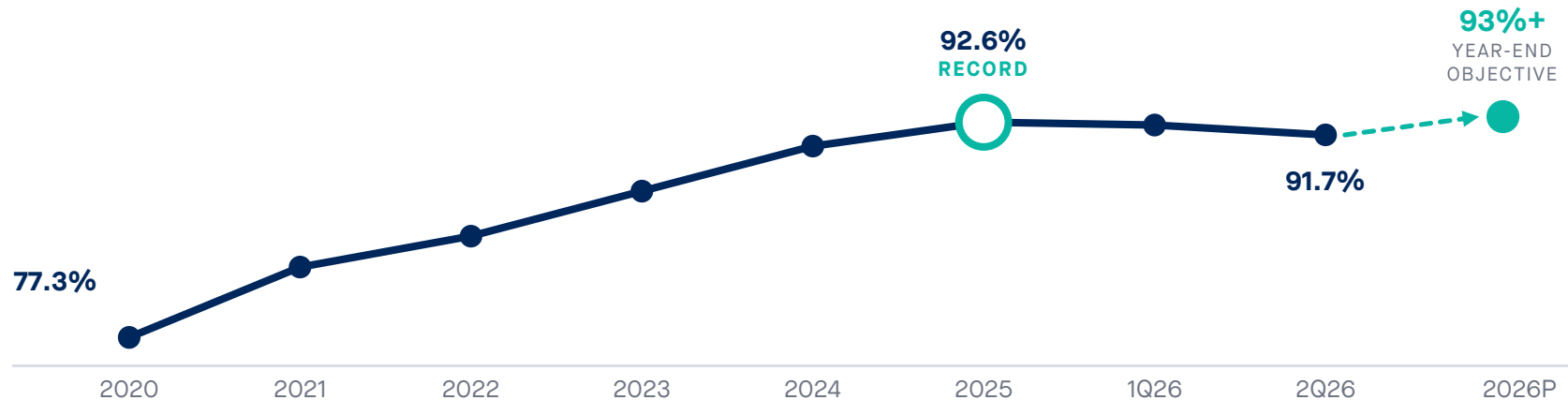

Shop occupancy has increased approximately 1,440 basis points since 2020, with a visible pipeline to achieve record highs



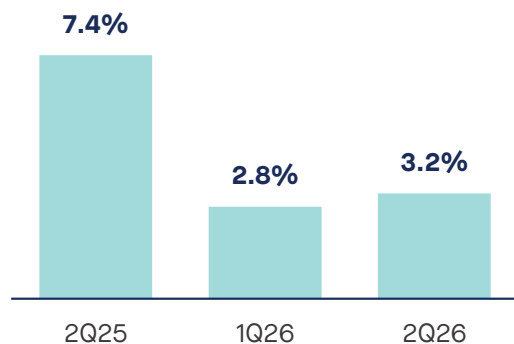
SHOP OCCUPANCY DRIVEN BY IMPROVED ANCHOR TENANCY, STRONG DEMAND AND LIMITED SUPPLY IN TOP MARKETS

- ▢ Substantial anchor retenancing and portfolio investment driving increased traffic
- ▢ Recaptured space at strong centers being repositioned to higher-credit, higher-rent operators
- ▢ Average >20% estimated mark-to-market on recaptured shop spaces
- ▢ ~210,000 square feet of shop leases in active negotiation, representing ~75 bps of shop occupancy
- ▢ Prospects include restaurant, fitness, apparel, service and other national concepts

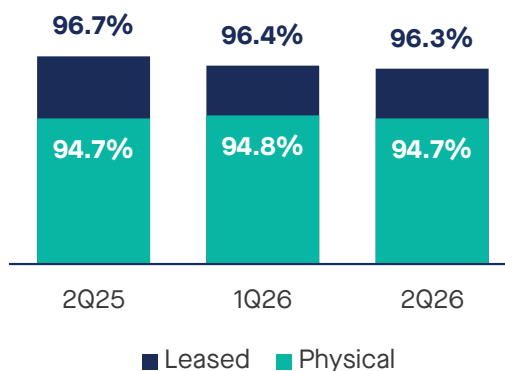

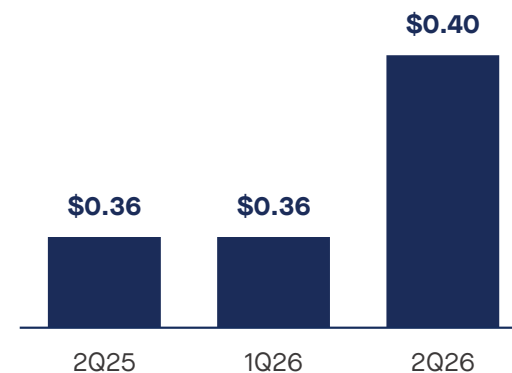
SP NOI Growth with Redev



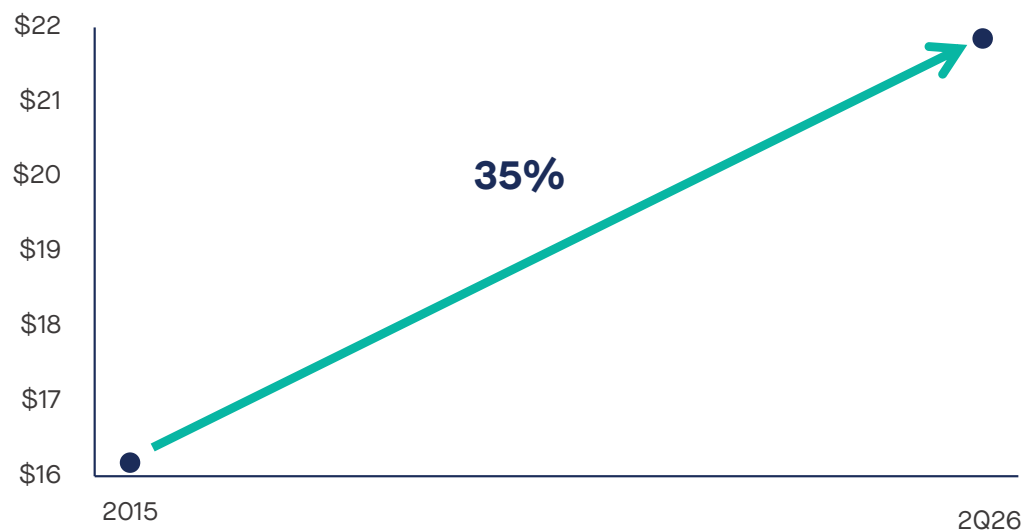
SP Occupancy

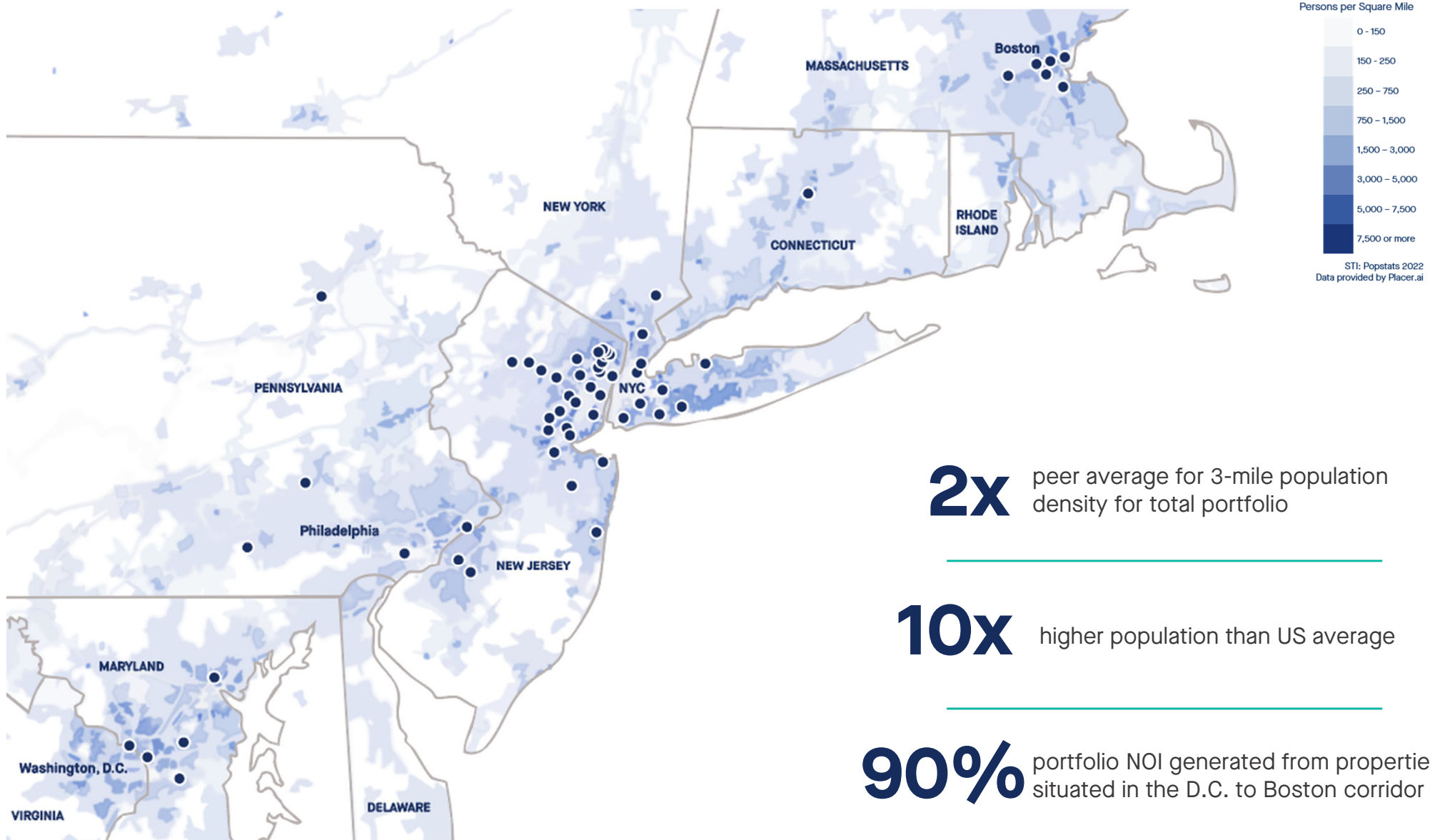

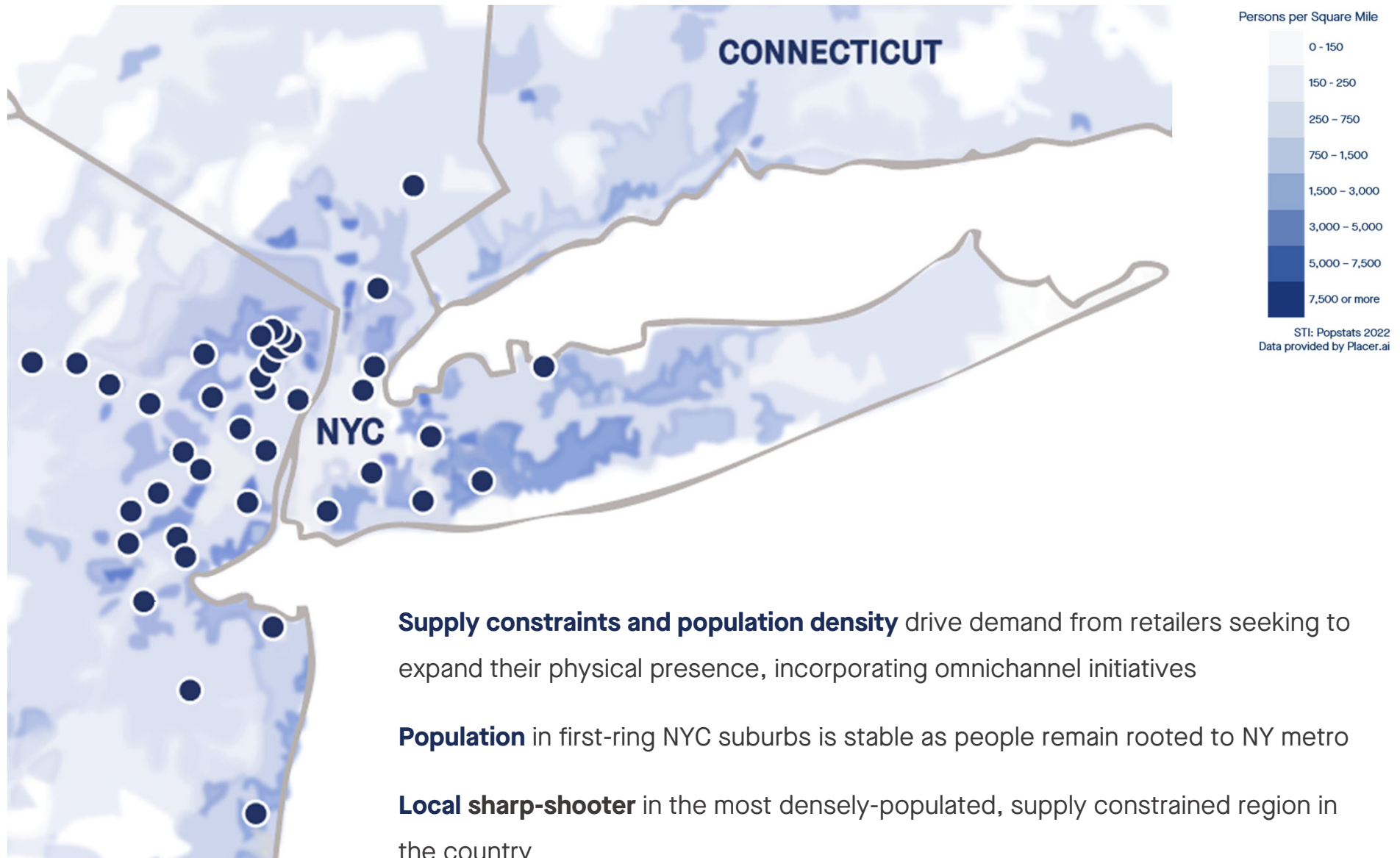
PORTFOLIO CONCENTRATED IN D.C. TO BOSTON CORRIDOR

Most heavily urbanized region in the U.S.

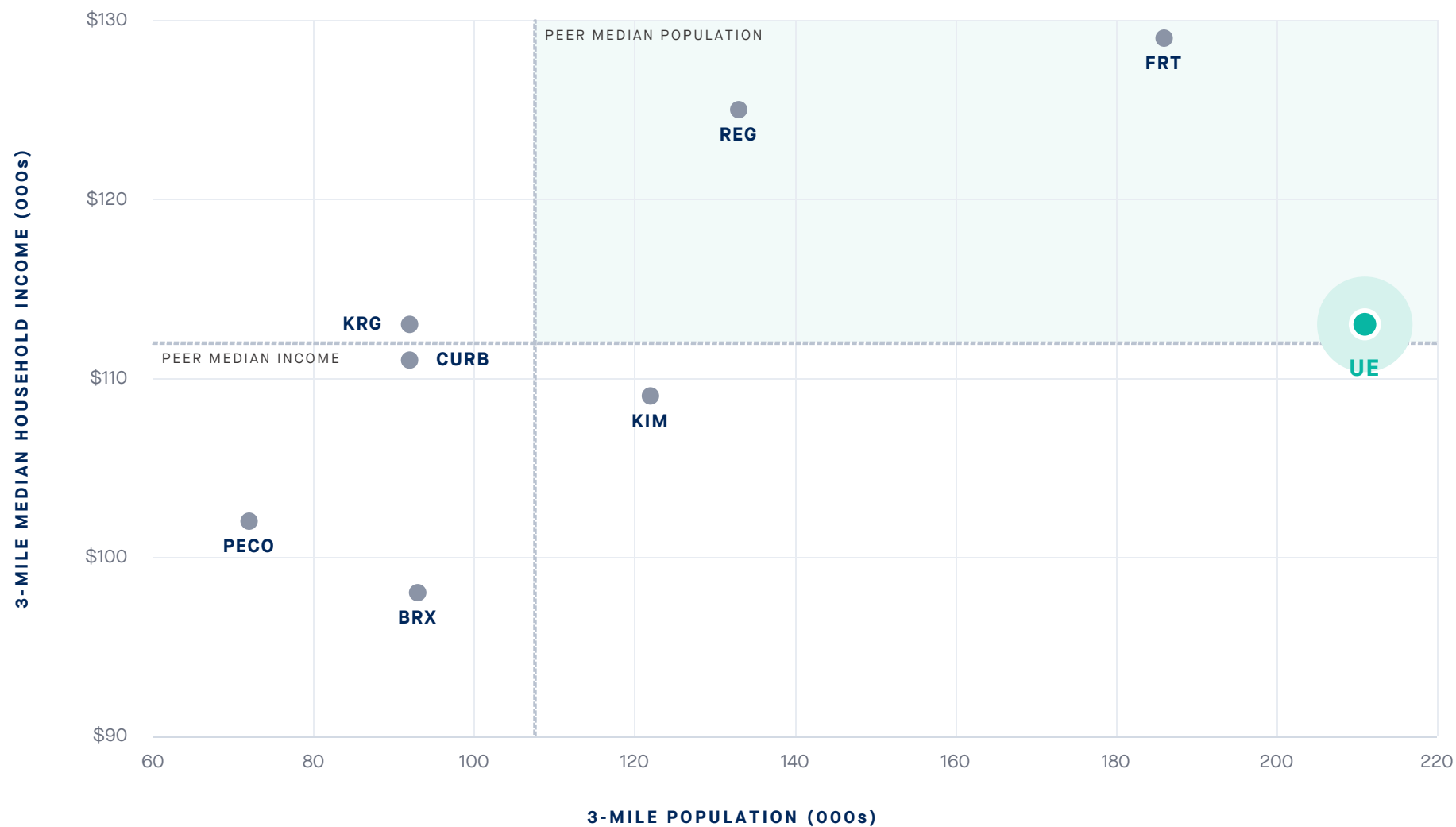


DOMINANT OWNER WITHIN FIRST-RING SUBURBS OF NY METRO

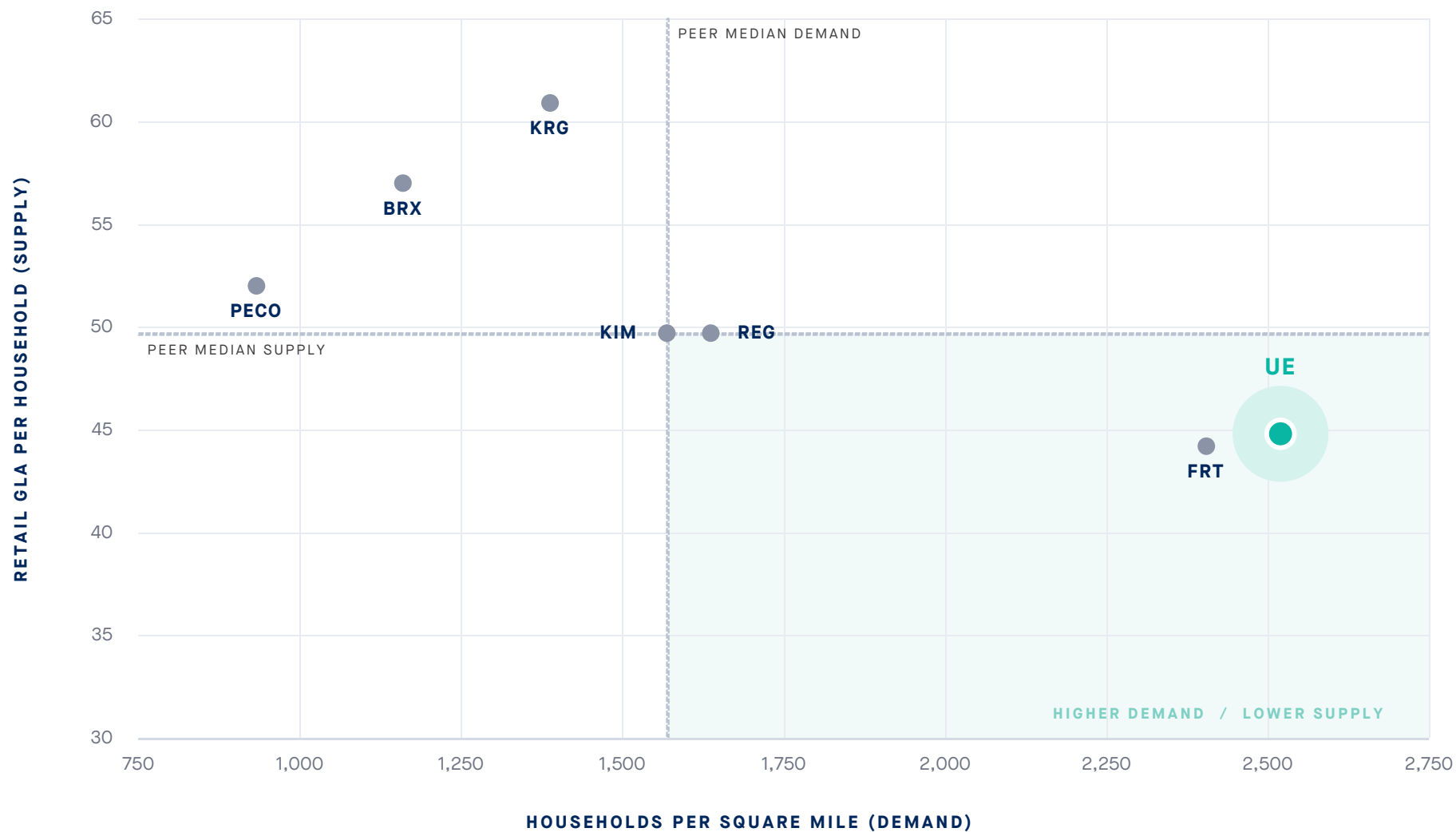


PORTFOLIO SITUATED IN DENSE, AFFLUENT U.S. SUBMARKETS

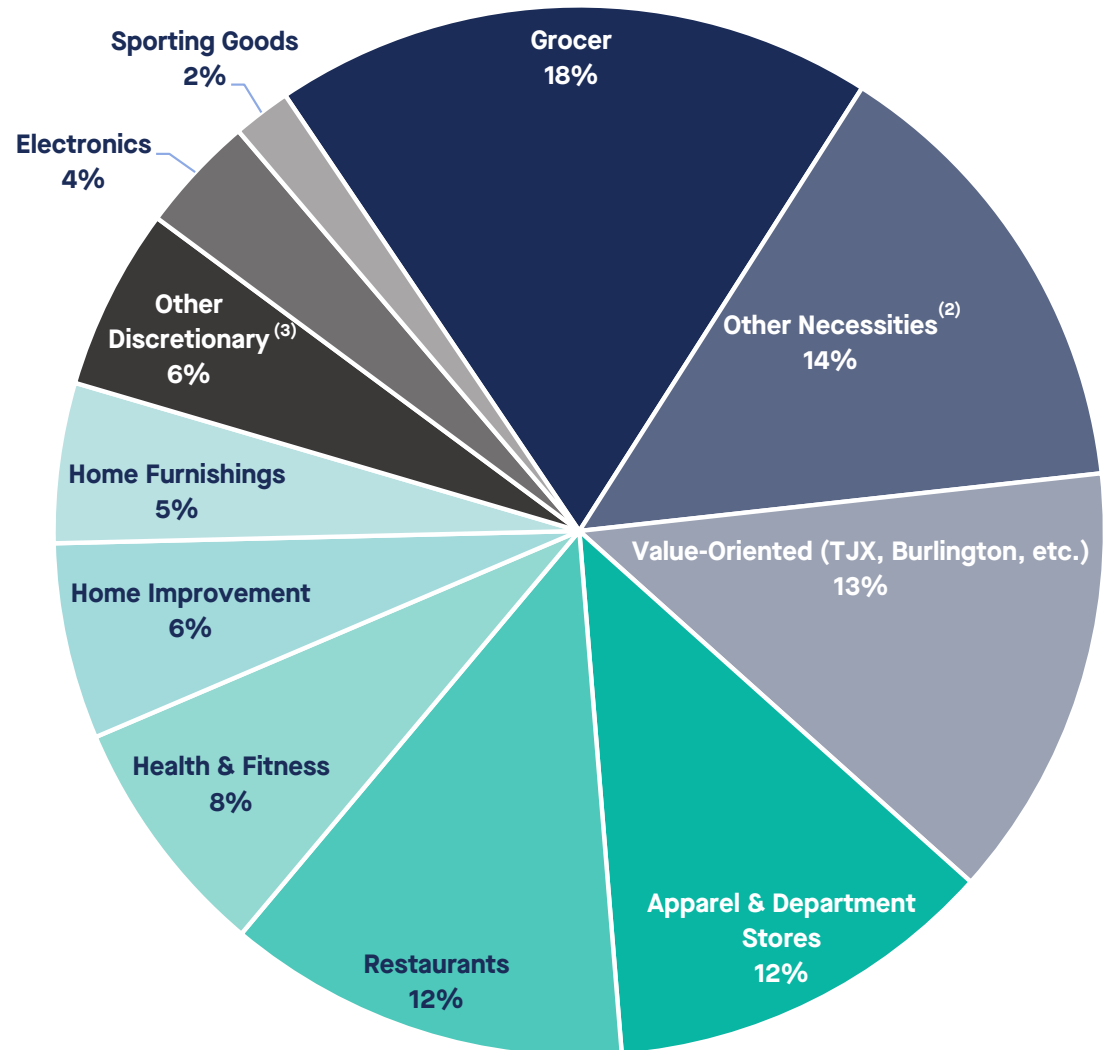

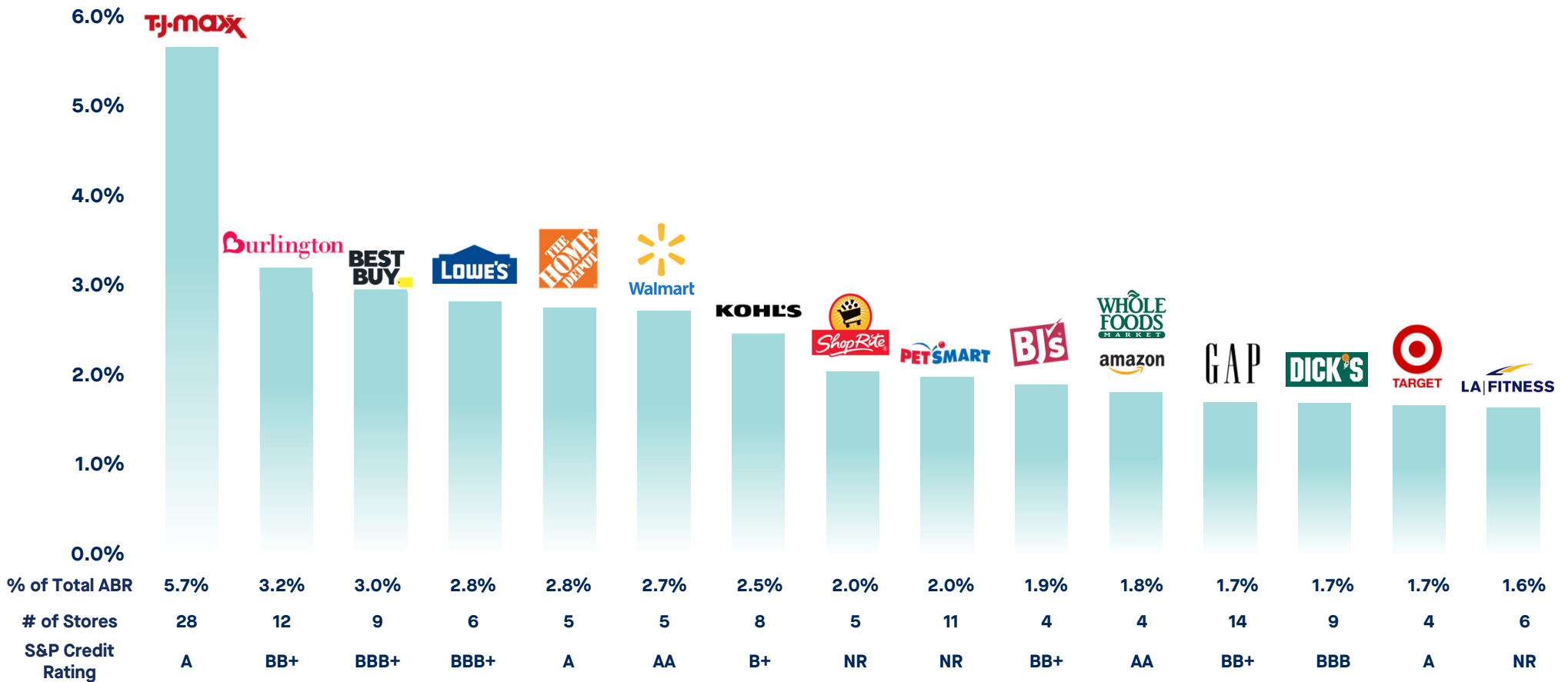

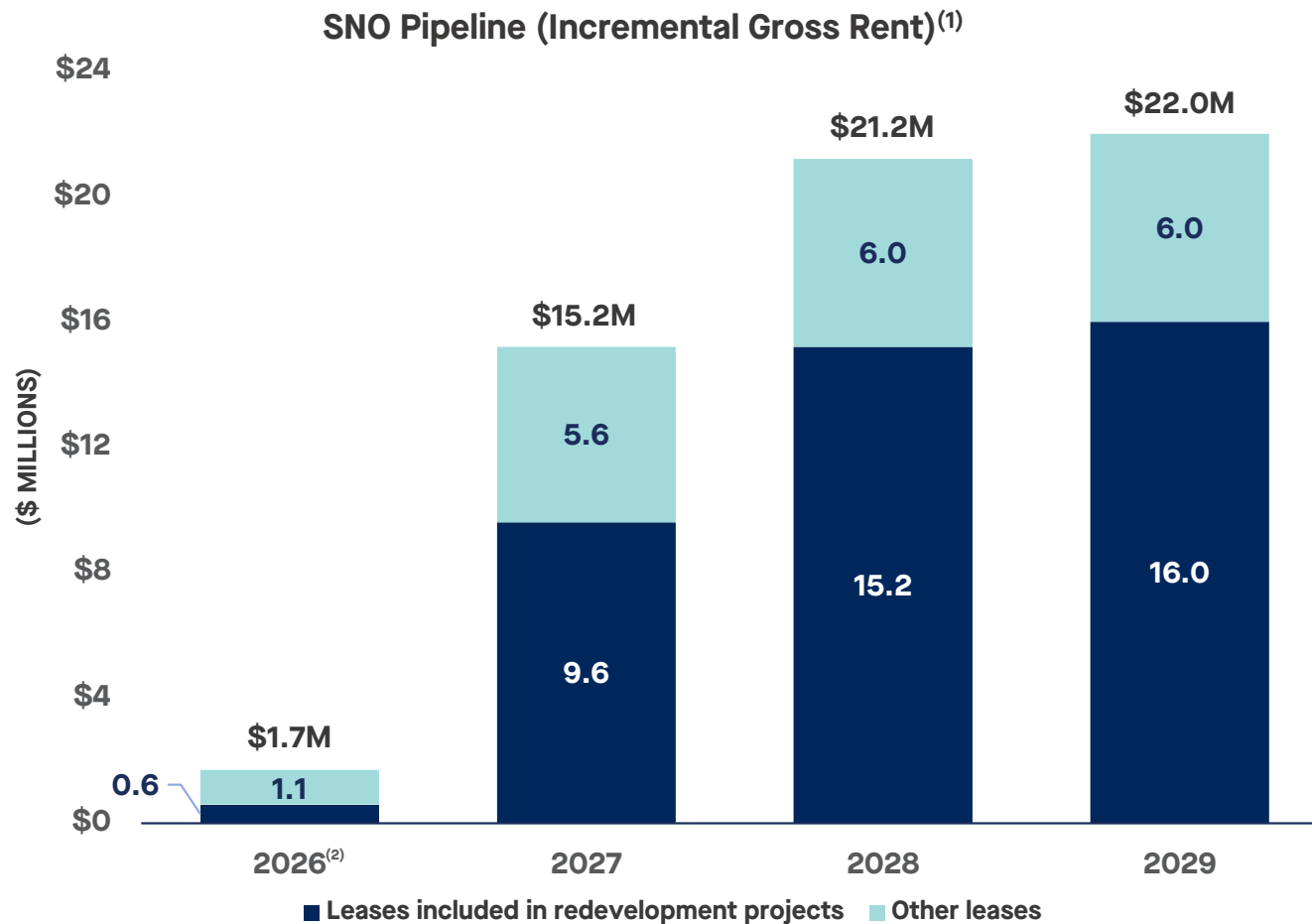

LEASES SIGNED NOT YET OPEN DRIVING NOI GROWTH

- ▮ \$22 million of future annual gross rent (7% of NOI) from the SNO pipeline will provide significant earnings and cash flow growth
- ▮ Anchor leases in the SNO pipeline reflect a blended ABR of \$27 psf vs \$18 psf in-place portfolio rent, highlighting significant embedded mark-to-market upside
- ▮ National and regional tenants represent ~90% of the SNO pipeline

STRUCTURAL TAILWINDS ARE IMPROVING LEASING ECONOMICS

Near record low market vacancy rate (<6%) and historically low levels of new construction, especially in the Northeast (0.2% of total SF) are driving improved lease terms

- Retailers are showing more flexibility in format size and new concepts are increasingly willing to accept non-prototype spaces to support expansion in a supply-constrained environment
- The competition for shopping center retail space is most prevalent among anchors greater than 20K sf, where new supply is primarily only available through vacancy created by store closings
- We estimate anchor rents will need to increase by >40% to make ground-up development economically feasible in our target markets
- Our infill portfolio in dense, supply constrained markets continues to draw leading retailers, resulting in better economic and noneconomic terms

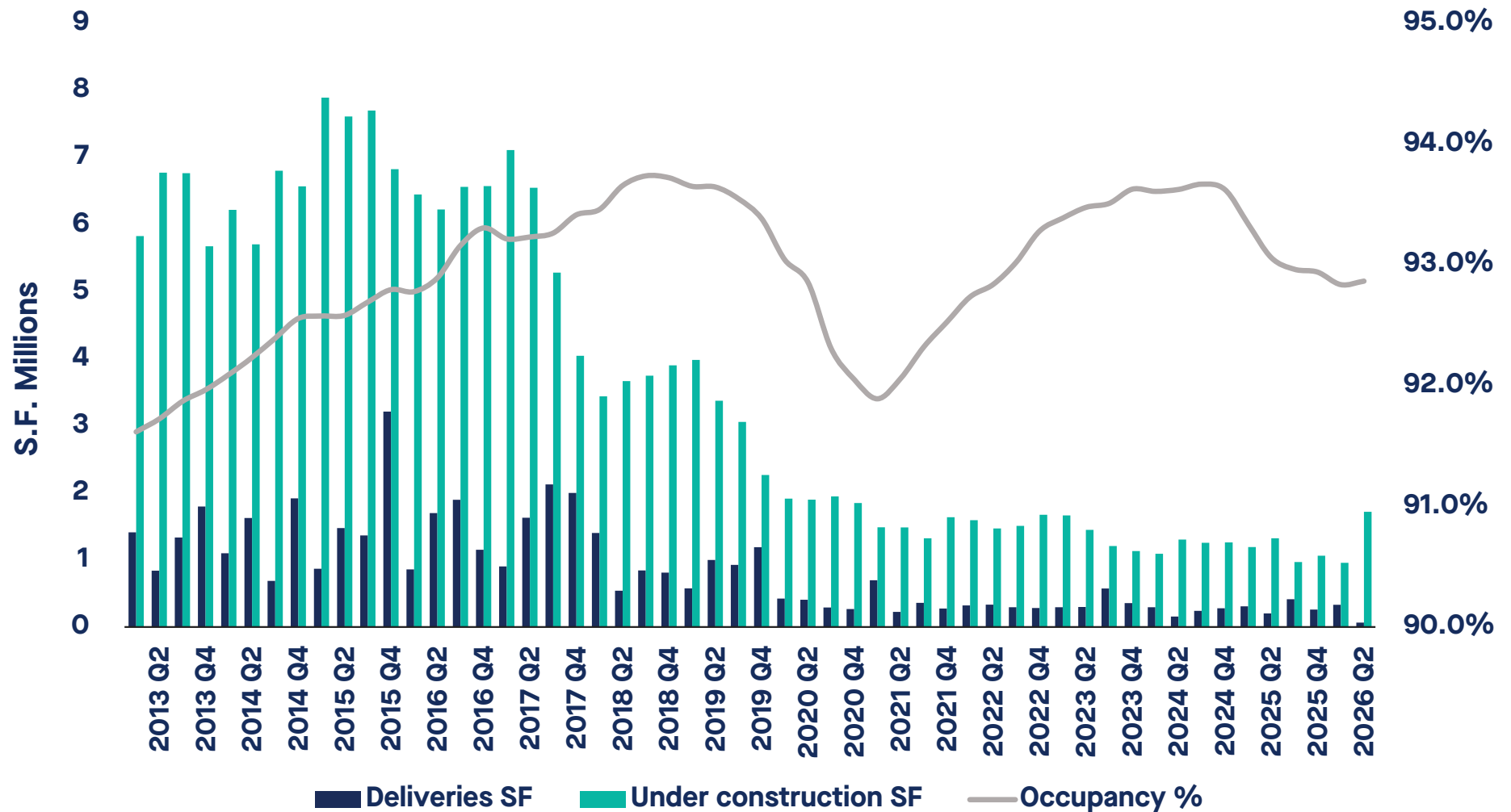

- Over the last 12 months, we delivered \$33M of completed redevelopments at a ~25% unleveraged yield
- Current pipeline includes \$155M of gross investment at a 12% unleveraged return

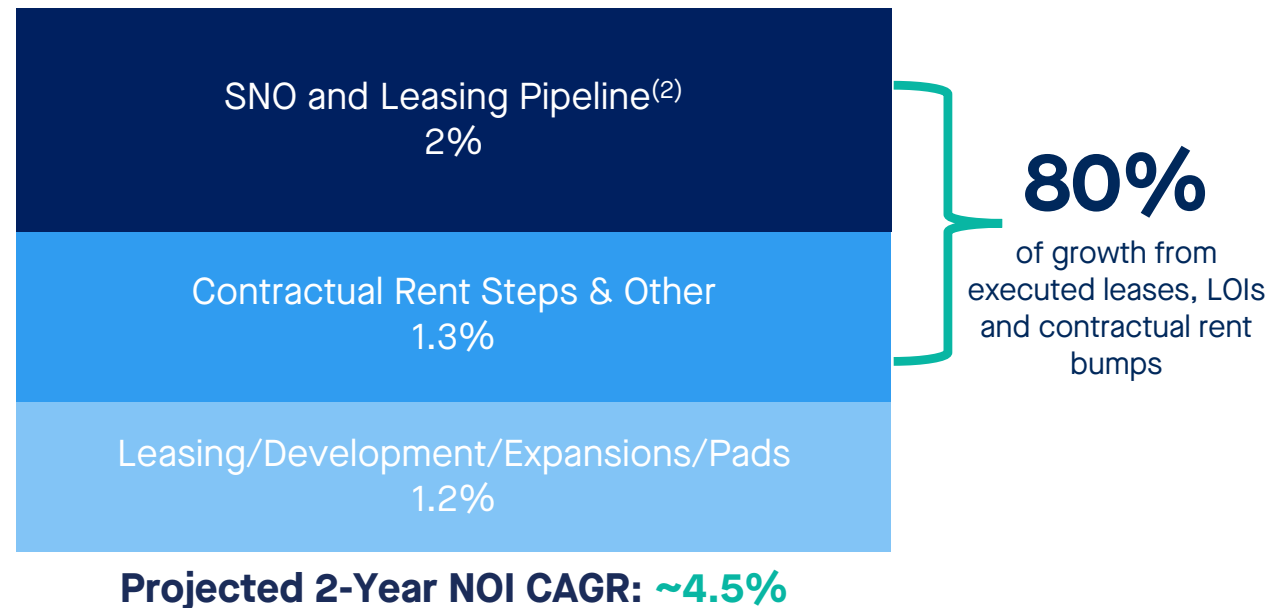

HIGHLY VISIBLE NOI GROWTH

Our growth is highly visible with a significant portion coming from six repositioning projects, including Bruckner Commons, Bergen Town Center, Plaza at Cherry Hill, Hudson, Plaza at Woodbridge, and Yonkers Gateway, which is expected to contribute \$14M (~65% of total SNO) in annualized gross rent.

ANCHOR REPOSITIONING FUELING FUTURE GROWTH WHILE REDUCING FUTURE CAPEX

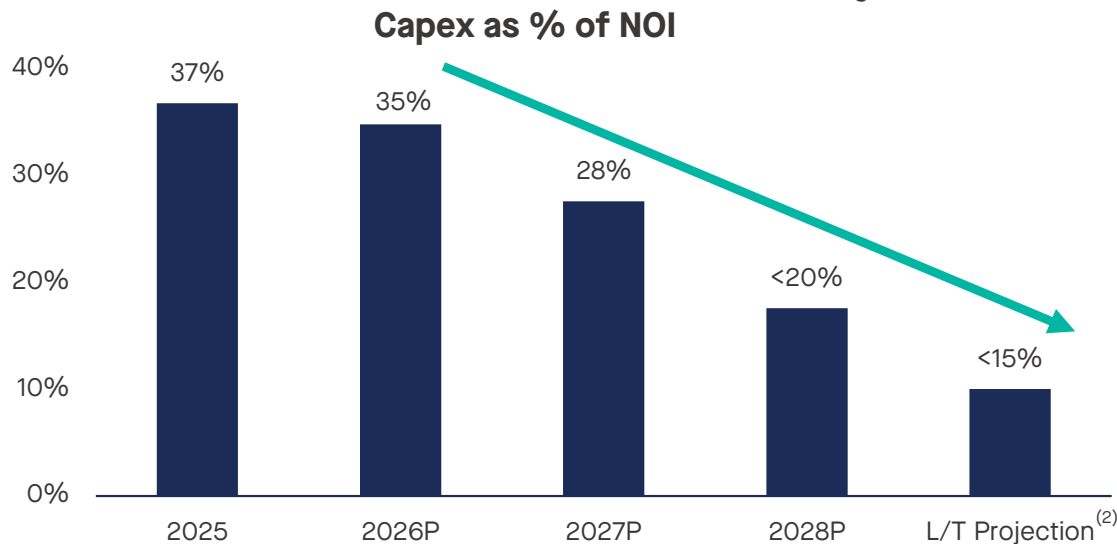
By 2027, we expect approximately 70% of our portfolio will have undergone redevelopment or repositioning since our spin from Vornado in 2015. Anchor leased occupancy increased from 92% to 97% since 2021. Upfront investments to improve property condition in conjunction with new anchors greatly reduces the need for substantial capital investment at these properties over the next ten years. These investments have attracted higher quality shop tenants driving shop occupancy from 85% in 1Q23 to 91.7% in 2Q26

Anchor Upgrades

RECENT ACQUISITION: THE SHOPS AT WEST FALLS CHURCH | FALLS CHURCH, VA

\$40.4 million acquisition in July 2026

- 85K sf neighborhood center, 94% leased and anchored by a long-tenured Safeway on a significantly below-market lease
- In-place rents are approximately 11% below market, supporting 3%+ NOI CAGR and an 8.2% unlevered IRR
- Infill Falls Church, VA location on Lee Highway less than two miles from the Capital Beltway, serving approximately 160K people within three miles with average household incomes above \$200K
- Family-oriented merchandise mix including Goldfish Swim School, KIPS Family Gymnastics, Sharkey's Cuts for Kids, Massage Envy and Great Clips drives dwell time and cross-shopping



RECENT ACQUISITION: VILLAGE AT BRIDGEWATER COMMONS | BRIDGEWATER, NJ

\$54 million acquisition in March 2026

- Acquisition structured as a reverse 1031 exchange
- 92K sf retail shopping center anchored by a brand-new freestanding 34K sf Summit Health medical building and strong performing small shop retail tenants.
- 65% of GLA is comprised of high performing F&B tenants (Cava, Chipotle, Starbucks, Shake Shack) averaging \$1,200 psf in sales
- Located in a supply constrained and affluent NJ retail submarket (3-mile AHHI of \$170K) along the highly trafficked Route 22; adjacent to Bridgewater Commons Mall and surrounding corporate offices.
- Ranks in the top quartile of national neighborhood centers by annual visits, outperforming multiple nearby grocery-anchored centers

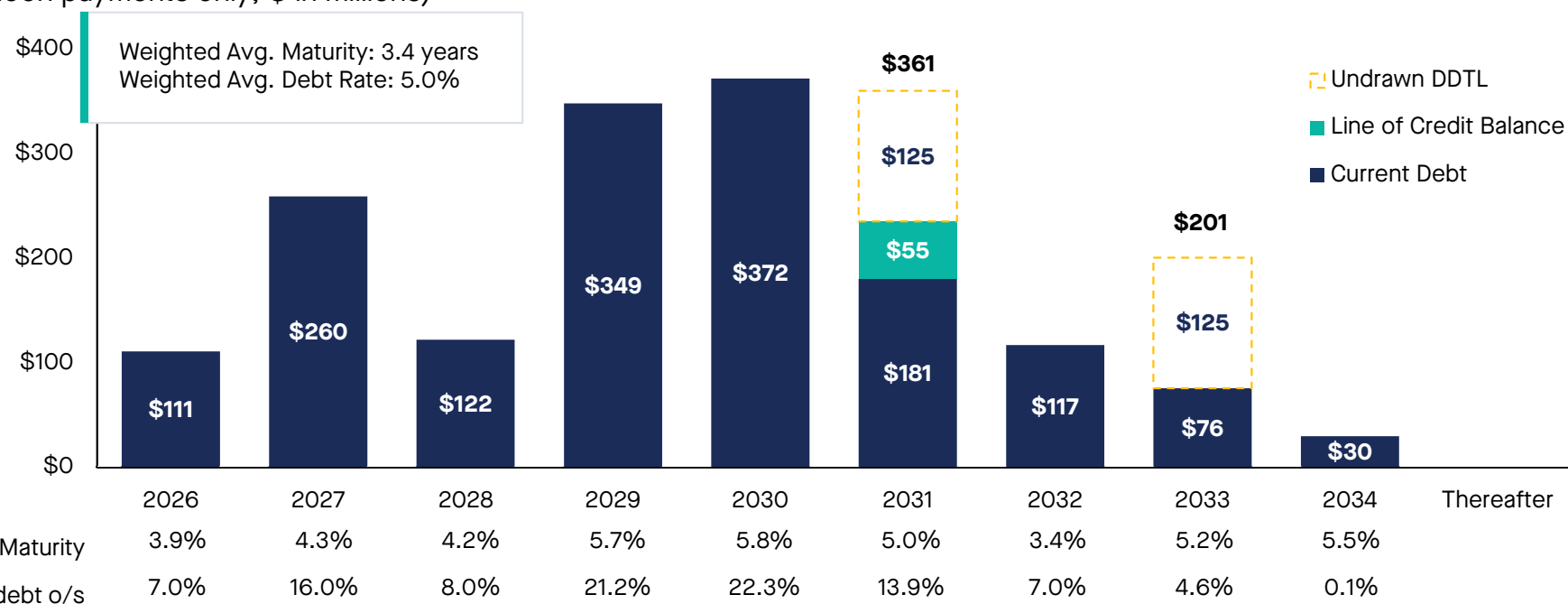

NON-GAAP FINANCIAL MEASURES

The Company uses certain non-GAAP performance measures, in addition to the primary GAAP presentations, as we believe these measures improve the understanding of the Company's operational results. We continually evaluate the usefulness, relevance, limitations, and calculation of our reported non-GAAP performance measures to determine how best to provide relevant information to the investing public, and thus such reported measures are subject to change. The Company's non-GAAP performance measures have limitations as they do not include all items of income and expense that affect operations, and accordingly, should always be considered as supplemental financial results. Additionally, the Company's computation of non-GAAP metrics may not be comparable to similarly titled non-GAAP metrics reported by other real estate investment trusts ("REITs") or real estate companies that define these metrics differently and, as a result, it is important to understand the manner in which the Company defines and calculates each of its non-GAAP metrics. The following non-GAAP measures are commonly used by the Company and investing public to understand and evaluate our operating results and performance:

FFO

The Company believes FFO is a useful, supplemental measure of its operating performance that is a recognized metric used extensively by the real estate industry and, in particular REITs. FFO, as defined by the National Association of Real Estate Investment Trusts ("Nareit") and the Company, is net income (computed in accordance with GAAP), excluding gains (or losses) from sales of depreciable real estate and land when connected to the main business of a REIT, impairments on depreciable real estate or land related to a REIT's main business, earnings from consolidated partially owned entities and rental property depreciation and amortization expense. The Company believes that financial analysts, investors and shareholders are better served by the presentation of comparable period operating results generated from FFO primarily because it excludes the assumption that the value of real estate assets diminishes predictably. FFO does not represent cash flows from operating activities in accordance with GAAP, should not be considered an alternative to net income as an indication of our performance, and is not indicative of cash flow as a measure of liquidity or our ability to make cash distributions.

FFO as Adjusted

The Company provides disclosure of FFO as Adjusted because it believes it is a useful supplemental measure of its core operating performance that facilitates comparability of historical financial periods. FFO as Adjusted is calculated by making certain adjustments to FFO to account for items the Company does not believe are representative of ongoing core operating results, including non-comparable revenues and expenses. The Company's method of calculating FFO as Adjusted may be different from methods used by other REITs and, accordingly, may not be comparable to such other REITs.

NOI

The Company uses NOI internally to make investment and capital allocation decisions and to compare the unlevered performance of our properties to our peers. The Company believes NOI is useful to investors as a performance measure because, when compared across periods, NOI reflects the impact on operations from trends in occupancy rates, rental rates, operating costs and acquisition and disposition activity on an unleveraged basis, providing perspective not immediately apparent from net income. The Company calculates NOI using net income as defined by GAAP reflecting only those income and expense items that are incurred at the property level and through the Company's captive insurance program, adjusted for non-cash rental income and expense, impairments on depreciable real estate or land, and income or expenses that we do not believe are representative of ongoing operating results, if any. In addition, the Company uses NOI margin, calculated as NOI divided by total property revenue, which the Company believes is useful to investors for similar reasons.

NON-GAAP FINANCIAL MEASURES (CONTINUED)

Same-property NOI

The Company provides disclosure of NOI on a same-property basis, which includes the results of properties that were owned and operated for the entirety of the reporting periods being compared, which total 65 properties for the three and six months ended June 30, 2026 and 2025. Information provided on a same-property basis excludes properties under development, redevelopment or that involve anchor repositioning where a substantial portion of the gross leasable area ("GLA") is taken out of service and also excludes properties acquired, sold, held for sale, or that are in the foreclosure process during the periods being compared, and results of our captive insurance program. As such, same-property NOI assists in eliminating disparities in net income due to the development, redevelopment, acquisition, disposition, or foreclosure of properties and results of our captive insurance program during the periods presented, and thus provides a more consistent performance measure for the comparison of the operating performance of the Company's properties. While there is judgment surrounding changes in designations, a property is removed from the same-property pool when it is designated as a redevelopment property because it is undergoing significant renovation or retenanting pursuant to a formal plan that is expected to have a significant impact on its operating income. A development or redevelopment property is moved back to the same-property pool once a substantial portion of the NOI growth expected from the development or redevelopment is reflected in both the current and comparable prior year period, generally one year after at least 80% of the expected NOI from the project is realized on a cash basis. Acquisitions are moved into the same-property pool once we have owned the property for the entirety of the comparable periods and the property is not under significant development or redevelopment. The Company has also provided disclosure of NOI on a same-property basis adjusted to include redevelopment properties. Same-property NOI may include other adjustments as detailed in the Reconciliation of Net Income to NOI and Same-Property NOI included in the tables accompanying this presentation.

EBITDAre and Adjusted EBITDAre

EBITDAre and Adjusted EBITDAre are supplemental, non-GAAP measures utilized by us in various financial ratios. The White Paper on EBITDAre, approved by Nareit's Board of Governors in September 2017, defines EBITDAre as net income (computed in accordance with GAAP), adjusted for interest expense, income tax (benefit) expense, depreciation and amortization, losses and gains on the disposition of depreciated property, impairment write-downs of depreciated property and investments in unconsolidated joint ventures, and adjustments to reflect the entity's share of EBITDAre of unconsolidated joint ventures. EBITDAre and Adjusted EBITDAre are presented to assist investors in the evaluation of REITs, as a measure of the Company's operational performance as they exclude various items that do not relate to or are not indicative of our operating performance and because they approximate key performance measures in our debt covenants. Accordingly, the Company believes that the use of EBITDAre and Adjusted EBITDAre, as opposed to income before income taxes, in various ratios provides meaningful performance measures related to the Company's ability to meet various coverage tests for the stated periods. Adjusted EBITDAre may include other adjustments not indicative of operating results as detailed in the Reconciliation of Net Income to EBITDAre and Adjusted EBITDAre included in the tables accompanying this presentation. The Company also presents the ratio of net debt (net of cash) to annualized Adjusted EBITDAre as of June 30, 2026, and net debt (net of cash) to total market capitalization, which it believes is useful to investors as a supplemental measure in evaluating the Company's balance sheet leverage.

The Company believes net income is the most directly comparable GAAP financial measure to the non-GAAP performance measures outlined above. Reconciliations of these measures to net income have been provided in the tables accompanying this presentation.

OPERATING METRICS

The Company presents certain operating metrics related to our properties, including occupancy, leasing activity and rental rates. Operating metrics used by the Company are useful to investors in facilitating an understanding of the operational performance for our properties.

Recovery ratios represent the percentage of operating expenses recuperated through tenant reimbursements. This metric is presented on a same-property and same-property including redevelopment basis and is calculated by dividing tenant expense reimbursements (adjusted to exclude any ancillary income) by the sum of real estate taxes and property operating expenses.

Occupancy metrics represent the percentage of occupied gross leasable area based on executed leases (including properties in development and redevelopment) and include leases signed, but for which rent has not yet commenced. Same-property portfolio leased occupancy includes properties that have been owned and operated for the entirety of the reporting periods being compared, which total 65 properties for the three and six months ended June 30, 2026 and 2025.

Occupancy metrics presented for the Company's same-property portfolio exclude properties under development, redevelopment or that involve anchor repositioning where a substantial portion of the gross leasable area is taken out of service and also excludes properties acquired within the past 12 months, properties sold or held for sale, and properties that are in the foreclosure process during the periods being compared.

Executed new leases, renewals and exercised options are presented on a same-space basis. Same-space leases represent those leases signed on spaces for which there was a previous lease.

The Company occasionally provides disclosures by tenant categories which include anchors, shops and industrial/self-storage. Anchors and shops are further broken down by local, regional and national tenants. We define anchor tenants as those who have a leased area of >10,000 sf. Local tenants are defined as those with less than five locations. Regional tenants are those with five or more locations in a single region. National tenants are defined as those with five or more locations and that operate in two or more regions.
